FIT Family Fact Sheet 1 - Insurance

- The Department of Health, Family Infant Toddler (FIT) Program provides early intervention services statewide through provider agreements with a network of private provider agencies. Your FIT provider agency is ______
- The Department of Health, Family Infant Toddler (FIT) Program pays for early intervention services with funds including: New Mexico state general funds; an annual grant from the US Department of Education; Medicaid; and private health insurance.

Private Insurance:

- FIT Program early intervention services are included as a benefit under private health insurance plans (as a result of Senate Bill 589 passed in 2005).
- Private health insurance plans are required to pay for FIT Program early intervention services, up to a yearly cap (maximum) of \$3,500. Early intervention services provided over this amount are paid by the Department of Health.
- What you should know about billing your child's health insurance plan:
 - o This will not affect your child's lifetime therapy benefit;
 - You will <u>not</u> be required to pay a co-pay;
 - You will <u>not</u> be required to pay a deductible.
- You will be asked to sign your consent (agreement) to bill your child's insurance plan and informed that you can withdraw consent at any time.
- Please make a copy of your insurance card and give it to your family service coordinator.

Medicaid:

- Medicaid pays for FIT Program early intervention services (Department of Health pays the state match).
- Families will not be required to pay a co-pay for FIT services funded by Medicaid and it will not affect your child's lifetime benefit through Medicaid.
- You will be asked to sign your consent (agreement) to bill your child's Medicaid plan and informed that you can withdraw consent at any time.
