# New Mexico Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) Plan

FFY 2019–2021



- As required in the Child Care and Development Block Grant Act of 2014
- Lead agencies must develop and conduct, no earlier than 2 years before the submission of their CCDF Plan, a statistically valid and reliable market rate survey (that reflects variations in the cost of child care services by geographic area, type of provider, and age of child) or
- An alternative methodology, such as a cost estimation model, that has been developed by the State Lead Agency (ECECD).





- New Mexico will seek approval to conduct an alternative methodology, a cost estimation model
- ECECD must consult with
  - State Advisory Council, local child care program administrators,
  - Local child care resource and referral agencies, and
  - Other appropriate entities prior to developing and conducting the market rate survey or alternative methodology





- ECECD must prepare a detailed report containing the results of the market rate survey or alternative methodology
- ECECD must make the report with results widely available
  - No later than 30 days after completion of the market rate survey or alternative methodology
  - Posting the results on the Internet





- This report must include the estimated cost of care (including any relevant variation by geographic location, category of provider, or age of child) necessary to support:
  - Child care providers' implementation of the health, safety, quality, and staffing requirements
  - Higher-quality care, as defined by ECECD, using a quality rating and improvement system or other system of quality indicators, at each level of quality.





- In the Child Care Development Fund Plan, ECECD must set payment rates for child care services that include:
  - Base payment rates sufficient for providers to meet the health, safety, quality, and staffing requirements.
  - Consideration of the cost of higher quality child care, including how rates for higher quality relate to the estimated cost of care at each level of quality.
  - Consideration of the views and comments of the public when setting rates.





### **Importance of Conducting a Cost Model**

- Financially sustainable subsidy providers are fundamental to the success and growth of New Mexico's child care industry
- The cost model shows
  - The cost of providing high-quality early care and education
  - The importance of maximizing known factors to help centers and homes account for operating costs







- ECECD and NMECDP convened internal working group and national cost model experts to conduct cost estimation model
- ECECD presents alternative methodology to members of the New Mexico Early Learning Advisory Council (ELAC) for input and discussion.
- ECECD requests to use alternative methodology submitted to Administration for Children and Families (ACF).
- ACF approves ECECD's use of alternative methodology.

- ECECD and NMECDP convenes stakeholders from organizations that represent early care and education providers for feedback
  - Head Start Association
  - New Mexico Voices for Children
  - New Mexico Association for the Education of Young Children
  - New Mexico Child Care and Education Association
  - New Mexico Early Childhood Development Partnership
- Cost model report published
- Subsidy reimbursement rates effective
