Legislative Session

- At the beginning of each year, New Mexico's elected Representatives and Senators meet at the State Capitol, called the Roundhouse, for the legislative session.
- The state holds two types of regular sessions:
 - 60-day session happens in odd-numbered years like 2025 and 2027. Legislators can discuss any topic during these sessions.
 - 30-day short session happen in even-numbered years like 2026 and 2028. This session is focused mainly on the state budget and specific topics the Governor asks them to consider.
- The Governor can also call special sessions at other times of the year if needed.

New Mexico Legislative Process

- **STEP 1: A BILL IS INTRODUCED AND ASSIGNED TO COMMITTEE(S)**
- **STEP 2: THE BILL IS HEARD IN COMMITTEE**

The bill starts in one chamber—either the House or the Senate. A small group of lawmakers, called a committee, reviews the bill. They talk about it, ask questions, and may suggest changes.
- **STEP 3: THE COMMITTEE VOTES**

The committee decides whether the bill should move forward. Each bill is typically reviewed by at least two committees and must pass each.

 - If they vote **yes**, the bill continues.
 - If they vote **no**, the bill dies.
- **STEP 4: THE FULL HOUSE OR SENATE VOTES**

The bill is debated and voted on by all members of the House or the Senate. This is called a floor vote.

The bill goes to the other chamber: If the bill passes one chamber, it goes to the other one (House or Senate) to repeat the same steps.
- **STEP 5: THE GOVERNOR DECIDES**

If both chambers pass the bill, it goes to the Governor. The Governor can:

 - Sign it into law
 - Veto it
- **STEP 6: THE BILL BECOMES LAW**

If the Governor signs the bill, it becomes a law. Some laws go into effect immediately. Others become effective later in the year.

The FY27 Executive Budget

Overview

- The FY27 Executive Budget builds on the strategic and successful investments of the New Mexico Legislature and Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham, which have improved the lives of tens of thousands of New Mexico families and young children.
- New Mexico became the first state in the nation to offer no-cost, universal child care on November 1, 2025. This created better access to families no matter their income, while saving them up to **\$14,000 per child each year**.
- This historic investment makes families stronger and more stable, supports the early childhood workforce, and gives families access to high quality child care.

ECECD Proposed 2026 Legislation

Child Care Zoning Requirement Act
Support child care supply building efforts and improve access to quality care for families by providing statewide consistency in land use for child care homes and centers.

- Requires county and municipal authorities to treat licensed and registered child care homes as residential use in the application of local regulations
- Prohibits local authorities from requiring child care homes to pay additional fees and taxes to operate
- Ensures child care homes are treated the same as other residential parking
- Ensures child care homes are treated the same as other residential safety codes
- Requires licensed child care centers to be located in multi-family residential zones and not in single-family residential zones
- Prohibits counties and municipalities from requiring additional fees and taxes to operate
- Restricts HOAs from prohibiting child care homes from operating in their community

2026 Legislative and Budget Priorities
Building a Brighter Future for New Mexico Families and Young Children

The FY27 Executive Budget builds on the strategic and successful investments of the New Mexico Legislature and Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham, which have improved the lives of tens of thousands of New Mexico families and young children. Why This Budget Matters

- The FY27 Executive Budget reflects New Mexico's continued commitment to families with young children and the early childhood workforce.
- As the legislative session moves forward, budget decisions will shape whether families can continue to rely on affordable child care, whether providers can stay open and retain staff, and whether our system remains stable for the long term.

Budget decisions are family decisions. The choices made this session will shape access to child care, workforce stability, and economic opportunity for New Mexico families.

Child Care Zoning Requirements

Support child care supply building efforts and improve access to quality care for families by providing statewide consistency in land use for child care homes and centers.


- Requires county and municipal authorities to treat licensed and registered child care homes as residential use in the application of local regulations
- Prohibits local authorities from imposing extra restrictions on child care homes that do not apply to other residences, such as special permits or additional off-street parking
- Ensures child care homes are treated like other private residences in fire and life safety codes
- Requires licensed child care centers to be permitted in commercial, mixed-use, or multi-family residential zones and prohibits local authorities from placing more restrictions on child care centers than those applied to others in the same zone
- Prohibits counties and municipalities from requiring child care providers to pay additional fees and taxes to operate a licensed or regulated child care facility
- Restricts HOAs from prohibiting child care homes in HOA governed communities

Tax Credit Incentive for Donations to Child Care Facilities

- Encourage investment in child care by providing personal and corporate income tax credits for those who donate to any child care facility licensed by ECECD.
- The bill stipulates an aggregate cap of \$10 million per year and a cap of \$500,000 per taxpayer per year.
- The supply and quality of child care will be strengthened in New Mexico by incentivizing donations that provide financial enhancements and fundraising opportunities for facility development and operational costs.
